

Monumental Conflict



Throughout August the news was filled with images of large groups protesting either in favor of, or against the removal of civil war monuments and the removal of the confederate battle flag from public spaces. The controversy at times has erupted into violence and brought to light all sorts of debate about the motivations behind the civil war and the actions taken by “heroes” on both sides of the conflict. As I watch, read, and listen to the conversations regarding these monuments to the United States’ broken past, I find myself dismayed to find that from all sides there seems to be an attempt to simplify and cleanse our history. It seems we are missing an opportunity to really engage in a discussion of who we are, but rather we try to shout one another down. With this in mind, I will wade into the murky waters and probably ruffle a few feathers.

Some preliminary thoughts: The controversy surrounds monuments and symbols of the civil war and any discussion regarding the civil war needs to remember that war is evil. Sometimes war is necessary, but it is always the result of evil and the fruition of evil. The civil war was particularly devastating, with more American soldiers dying, nearly 500,000, in the civil war than any other war we have engaged in.

The slavery which was foundation for much of the United States economic success was evil and absolutely vile. I don’t know of another place or time in history where human slavery reached such depths of depravity. The scale, violence, hopelessness, and racial subjugation of the chattel slavery in the United States is unmatched.

The motivations for fighting the civil war were impure and varied on both sides. There were many who fought for and supported the Union forces who were fully in favor of slavery, while there were others on the Confederate side who opposed it. Clearly, the defense of institutionalized slavery was a significant motivation for the Confederates, but that does not automatically mean that the Union motivations were purely altruistic. Robert E. Lee wrote his wife that slavery was evil¹, while Abraham Lincoln clearly saw people of color as an inferior.

Preliminaries over, may the feather ruffling begin...

The confederate war monuments, and the confederate battle flag represent people who were willing to give their lives to defend their convictions as to what was socially, morally, and economically best for our country. My conviction that many of those convictions, particularly beliefs which view people of color as inferior to people of European ancestry, to be not only incorrect but evil. I believe the Christian scriptures, human history, and sociology have all proven that human slavery, in all forms, is evil. It would be easy to assume that all of the men and women who supported slavery and benefited from it were evil. It would be really wonderful to view the history of American slavery through black and white lenses, then we can clearly put ourselves on the side of the good-guys and the Robert E. Lees, Confederate Soldiers, and Southern slaveowners on the side of the bad-guys. Us versus them. Life is easier that way.



But I think that history shows that many, if not most of those who supported the confederacy, and American slavery, really thought they were doing the right thing and believed they were defending a moral order established by God. People will do a lot of very selfish and evil things as long as it will benefit them. Very early on in the civil war it became clear that the Civil war was going to be a losing proposition for everyone. Yet, Confederate families continued to make sacrifices and give their lives. Their convictions led them to believe that they were defending not only themselves but what was morally right.

For me, the confederate battle flag and the monuments scattered around this country commemorating heroes of the confederacy serve as a reminder that good people sometimes hold convictions which are not only incorrect, but evil. There are things that are worth fighting for and things that are worth dying for, but too often we allow ourselves to make sacrifices on the altars of personal convictions which we have left un-scrutinized. When good people hold to beliefs that are incorrect, we can end up making very bad decisions.

⁶ Rejoice always, ¹⁷ pray without ceasing, ¹⁸ give thanks in all circumstances; for this is the will of God in Christ Jesus for you. ¹⁹ Do not quench the Spirit. ²⁰ Do not despise prophecies, ²¹ but test everything; hold fast what is good. ²² Abstain from every form of evil. ²³ Now may the God of peace himself sanctify you completely, and may your whole spirit and soul and body be kept blameless at the coming of our Lord Jesus Christ. (1 Thess. 5:16-23 ESV)

As Christians, we are called to live lives that are filled with examination. This includes the examination of our convictions, even our religious convictions. There are many who teach in the name of Jesus who are not giving Jesus' teachings. And so, we are called to live in community holding everything accountable to the totality of God's revelation to us in the Holy Scriptures, and particularly to the testimony of God in the life, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. It is my experience that when we actively do this, we find that many of our convictions change over time. The more we open ourselves up to the convictions of others, the more we find clarity in our own beliefs and the actions we take based on those beliefs. In the slave-owning south, many held to the convictions of the society around them without testing those convictions. Do I do the same?

We are also called to examine our own complicity in the things that are broken in the world. There were many northerners who supported the union who were deeply complicit in the evil slavery that was taking place in the south. Southern slavery in many ways enabled the entire United States to enjoy the kind of economic success which allowed for the country to survive the first tenuous years of its existence. We often find ourselves in a similar situation. Our lives are made better by unjust systems which are a part of our society. In what places are we called to take a stand and fight for justice?

When I, by the grace of God, enter into eternity, I expect that even having lived a life of self-examination I will see that there were places that I should have believed and acted differently. By all accounts, Robert E. Lee was a God-fearing man who took his faith very seriously. He, I expect, was heartbroken when he learned where his convictions were in error. This is why we cannot rely on our own perfection to earn God's love and grace. It is God himself who sanctifies us completely so that when our Lord Jesus returns we are found blameless.

There is an opportunity that exists whenever we find ourselves looking at our nations many symbols of the civil war: 1)To embrace them as a reminder of our total dependence on Christ, and 2)to use them as an impetus for us to engage in our own self-examination. To completely erase these symbols from our society is to pretend that our history is one that is black and white, and to presume that we are on the side of good. To me that would be a loss. Let us remember our history with clarity so that we can live out our future with equal clarity. Instead of fighting for the removal of these symbols why not fight to tell the whole story of the Civil war, and the story of our Savior who has loved us and blessed us, in spite of our nation's sin.

Buna's Story:

At the age of 18, Buna ran away to escape her father's beatings. She lived at a temple, and word spread and other men living at the temple began abusing Buna. Finally, after eight years, she ran away. For over a week, Buna lived in the woods and ate dried leaves and rice paddies. Then in desperation she returned to her village. Buna's aunt and sister gave her money to open up a small tea shop. A man who came to her shop told her about the opportunity for good jobs in India and she agreed to go with the man.

Once in India, Buna was sold to a brothel. "My life was difficult," says Buna. "I have been in brothels and many times I tried to commit suicide." Each time this happened, the brothel owner beat her. Older women who lived in the brothel encouraged Buna to remain strong. After 22 months, Buna contracted tuberculosis and HIV and had large abscesses on her body. Since she was too sick to work, the brothel owner kicked her out. Buna made her way to Kathmandu and checked into a hospital. There she met Shanta, who was having surgery at the same hospital.

Shanta told Buna that she would care for her. Shanta brought Buna to her home before PRC was formed. Every day Shanta gave Buna food, changed her dressings on the abscesses and prayed for her. Buna became an advocate against trafficking, and her goal is to educate rural populations about the tricks traffickers use. "I walk house to house and say, 'If new faces come to your village with the promise of good jobs in India, please do not believe them.'" People ask how she could know about this and she replies, "They told me the same things and took me to India and sold me into prostitution. Now I am HIV positive. I have come to share with you to save you from the same fate."

Buna lives and works as a house mother in Chitwan, where she mentors the girls and teaches them how to knit bags and purses to sell at the market. Through determination and hard work she is no longer defined by her illness. Buna is very proud of her story. She believes that because she shares it, others will not have to endure the hardships that she has. Buna has found peace. "I would like to go to every country to tell my story," she says.




